Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In each of our worship services for the past few years we have concluded our "Prayers of the People" with the petition, "Finally, Lord, we lift up Shepherd of the Hill. Continue to reveal to us your purpose and your vision for this ministry." Knowing God's purpose for Shepherd of the Hill is critical. Without purpose we have no vision. And, as the old King James Bible tells us, "Where there is no vision, the people perish" (Proverbs 29:18). At times in the history of the Church (as well as is the history of nearly every congregation like Shepherd of the Hill) we have assumed that the purpose of the congregation was . . . the congregation. We too often have presumed that God had called and gathered us and enlightened us with His Holy Spirit only for our own salvation.

Jesus was consistently confronted with that same near-sightedness in His discussions with the Pharisees. The Pharisees interpreted God's vision as only that which would benefit the Jews. But Jesus had an infinitely greater vision, which He borrowed from Isaiah: "On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for ALL peoples a feast of rich food" (Isaiah 25:6). Jesus didn't come just for the Jews, He came for ALL humanity. SOTH does not exist just for SOTH; we exist for the sake of a broken world. God wants to use us to redeem and restore a world in need of redemption and restoration – starting right here in our neighborhood. There are three things that I want us to focus on as congregation:

- 1. Our area of responsibility is not just 925 E. 9th Street and the seven acres our church sits on. Our area of responsibility is the neighborhood that surrounds us.
- 2. Our mark of faithfulness should not be just how many people come to worship on a weekend or how much money is given. Our mark of faithfulness should be the faithful service and love we give as individuals and congregation.
- 3. We are ALL ordained by virtue of our baptism. We all have a call to be ambassadors for Christ.

Each of these three points reminds us that church is not a destination but rather a jumping off point; church is a place of God's healing, education, and nourishment from which we jump into mission and ministry in the world that surrounds us.

Where do we begin? We begin by listening. Next weekend, November 9-10, Jamie Koziol, principal of Milne Grove Elementary will come and help us to get to know our neighborhood from the perspective of our closest school. Also, Rev. Robin Brown, Associate Director for the ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Appeal will be with us sharing some of the wonderful work the ELCA is doing to alleviate hunger both nationally and internationally. Through these two women, our understanding of this world around us can deepen and we can be reminded that what we do can help. Remember the points of focus!

We have been called, we have been gathered, we are being equipped, and we are being sent.

Here we go.



Greetings,

This month baptism has been on my mind. The first weekend in October my niece was baptized. Rachel and I were asked to be her baptismal sponsors, there we stood at the baptismal font of my sister's church, with this little 2 month-old baby, oblivious to the world. The baptismal vows that were read were not too different then my own, the ones that my parents made some 27 years earlier. And I think of our eight newly confirmed students, who 14 or 15 years ago were held in front of a baptismal font by their parents and sponsors. The baptismal vows are found in our hymnal:

To live with them among God's faithful people, bring them to the word of God and the holy supper, teach them the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, place in their hands the holy scriptures, and nurture them in faith and prayer, so that your children may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, Care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace.

For many of us our parents lived these promises for us for fifteen years. Then in our confirmation we took ownership of these vows, when we affirmed our baptism we took ownership of these vows. These promises we own for ourselves come from the confirmation service in our hymnal:

To live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

These are our calls. These are the promises we made at our confirmation. Confirmation is not graduation. At graduation we are recognized for the work that we have done. Confirmation is a commissioning, we have made promises to carry moving forward. Promises that are not just for when we are young, or when we are old, but promises that we live out every single day.

As congregation we promise to pray for and support parents and youth in baptism and we promise to pray for and support youth in their confirmation. But we must also remember that we are to model and live out our own baptismal calls. Whether our confirmation was last week, 15 years ago, or 70 years ago we have all made similar vows.

We pray for our brothers and sisters in Christ who affirmed their baptism this past week, may the holy spirit lead and guide them as they continue to serve you, and we lift up all of those who have affirmed their baptism before them, we pray that the spirit continue to ignite in them a passion and a drive to serve you. Amen.

President Steve Kirk called the meeting to order at 6:31 PM.

<u>Present:</u> Pastor Jon Pedersen, Steve Kirk, Amber Gayhart (Nickel), Nell Pieper, Tom Gustafson, Phil Sleezer, Pricie Rogan, Tim Houseward, Ken Bobek

Absent: Rick McManis

Special Order of Business / Guests:

- Troy Siewert (SOTH member and Orland Park Police Officer) shared insight on the following:
 - Oversees the Crisis Intervention Team (C.I.T.), which handles mental health crisis and responses.
 - Works with a network of stakeholders (i.e. law enforcement, advocacy groups, mental health providers, community members) to build community connectedness.
 - Shared statistics such as: 1 in 5 people suffer from mental illness, 60% of those experiencing mental health do not seek assistance.
 - Mental Health First Aid trainer and is willing to provide a free one eight hour or two four hour training for those interested at SOTH.
- Dr. Jill House (share library restoration project)
 - Assisting Dr. Caneva with renovating and utilizing library room
 - Presently there are five volunteers for the library restoration but looking for more volunteers.
 - Will be putting together a bulletin flyer to share in the coming weeks
 - Church members can view the library any time before, between, and/or after Sunday services. The library restoration group members will be available for questions.

The Council shared personal "highs/lows" and prayed for one another.

Minutes of the September 18th Council meeting were approved prior to the meeting, via email.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Treasurer Houseward shared the monthly financial reports, developed by Ken Franz, for the following months: July, August, and September.

Pastor's Report (Highlights): Pastor Pedersen presented his monthly report. He highlighted the following:

- November 10th: Workshop on communicating with people with dementia open to the entire congregation
- November 11th: Welcoming New Members (date TBA) Savannah Waldvogel (Caden), Mike & April Cole (M.J. & Mia), Alice Pritchett, Mike & Audrey Bjerum, Christine Wallace, Eric & Susan Krause (Charlie & Otto), John Ahrens, and Julie Lingl. A motion was made by Tim Houseward (2nd by Pricie Rogan) for approval.

Youth Ministry Coordinator's Report (Highlights): Mike Markwell shared his monthly report. The following updates are:

New Business:


- a. Giving Tree Tom

OUR NEXT 24-HOUR DEEP-BREATH IN-HOME RETREAT WILL BE SATURDAY, DECEMBER 1st, THROUGH SUNDAY, DECEMBER 2nd.

One of the reasons we are hosting this event is to help people experience Sabbath time in your own ordinary life. To that end, we invite you to block out a full, 24-hour day beginning at 5 pm Saturday, December 1st until 6 pm Sunday, December 2nd - and that you guard this time as you would guard a family vacation that you've driven three hours away to attend. In other words, don't schedule anything overlapping and think about how you might "pack" for such an event.

1. Consider what you would like to "leave behind" when you begin this experience.

- Would you bring your work laptop or papers to correct to a Sabbath retreat?
- What about your cell phone, Facebook, or the laundry?
- Would you want to spend that time away doing your taxes, preparing for your mother's visit, or fretting about a coworker conflict?

A question to ask is: What would feel like a huge relief to leave behind for 24 hours?

2. Consider what you would like to "bring" to this experience.

What activities give you joy or bring you rest? Knitting, napping, drawing or dreaming, reading, or relaxing in the bath? What do you need to do in advance to be ready to follow your heart if the moment arises - a good book? Some new yarn? A puzzle? "Bring" those things to your Sabbath retreat.

Food is part of your day. Would you love a day not to cook? What can you get or do in advance to allow that? Would you love the chance to linger in the kitchen and create a lavish meal? What can you get or do in advance to allow that?

Who in your life will be sharing this experience with you? Children? Spouse? Friends?

How can this day be a different kind of day for you all? If you are alone a lot, consider spending part of the day with someone whose company you enjoy. If you're around people a lot, consider finding a pocket of time each person in your house can do something alone, or plan an hour when everyone is quiet together (this CAN work with kids! - we'll talk about how, if you'd like!). If you will be with a partner and/or kids, what do you enjoy doing as a family that you don't often make time to do? What can you look forward to together?

A question to ask is: What would feel like a huge gift to be able to bring into your experience?

3. When the bus leaves for camp...

The Jewish Sabbath begins right at sundown - not by a time on a clock or by someone's to-do list or when everything is finished and everyone is ready for it. When the sun drops below the horizon, the Sabbath has begun. What's done is done, what is undone remains undone.

The important thing is that everything gets set down, so that space may be opened up within us and between us, to be met by God just as we are.

Sabbath is a day for being, instead of doing.

This means that if the time comes and you have done no preparing, *do not worry*. Get on the bus anyway - this day will be a blessing to you. It really will! And even if you look ahead and think that while you "intended" to participate, some super important things came up and you simply do not have time, *all the more reason you keep to the boundaries of your day set apart*. Get on the bus anyway - this day will be a blessing to you. IT REALLY WILL.

Finally, as the day comes to a close on Sunday evening, we will provide you with a closing blessing to mark your transition back to ordinary time. We will also provide a means online for participants to share about their experience with each other for those of you who would enjoy this. We will get you this information (along with a recipe or two) later in the week.
