

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. . . And the Word became flesh and lived among us." (John 1:1, 4-5, 14)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

For the first couple of winters after we had moved to Lockport, Sonya and I had to answer the same question over and over again, "Why would you ever want to move from the warmth of California to an Illinois winter?" I would always answer the same way, "I really don't mind the snow and the cold as much as I mind the dark." (You will have to ask Sonya how she would respond.) I do NOT like it when the sun sets at 4:20 p.m. It has taken a couple of years, but I have come to appreciate the need to put up Christmas lights outside our home. Christmas lights are a way to declare to the encroaching darkness of winter, "I am going to push back against you. You can come this far and no further."

Light is an important part of the season of Advent (the four weeks of preparation before the coming of Christmas). As we inch closer to the longest nights of the year, we light candles in anticipation of the coming of the true "Light of the World," Jesus Christ. Advent is a season of the Church that serves the same purpose as the Christmas lights we put up outside of our homes. In the season of Advent, God whispers to the darkness of our spiritual natures affected by sin and hopelessness and says, "You can come this far and no further." Together with God, we light the candles of Advent to push back against sin, hopelessness, and darkness.

Some ask, "Why don't we just skip Advent and go directly to Christmas?" Here is where I return to the answer I give to those who ask me about Illinois winters. While I am not a fan of the dark of winter, I am a HUGE fan of the light and color of spring. Give me spring and Easter over winter and Christmas any day of the week. However, without the dark of winter, I would not appreciate the return of the light. Without the bleak white and brown of this season, I would take for granted the colors of the next season. Without the knowledge of my sin, I would not appreciate the nature of God's forgiveness and grace. Ask any cancer survivor about their life journey and — more often than not — you will hear of a greater appreciation of life, love, and family now than from before. This doesn't mean that the time of darkness and struggle is easy. On the contrary — it is very hard. But God gives us hope — that hope is called Advent.

Join us as we celebrate HOPE! Join us as we – together with God – push back against the darkness.



President Steve Kirk called the meeting to order at 6:34 PM.

The Council shared personal "highs/lows" and prayed for one another.

Minutes of the October 16th Council meeting were approved prior to the meeting, via email.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Treasurer Houseward shared the account status and is working with Ken Franz on the monthly statement, along with the yearly budget report.

<u>Pastor's Report (Highlights):</u> Pastor Pedersen presented his monthly report. He highlighted the following:

- Shared update from the November 18th the Community Thanksgiving Service at Congregational Church in Lockport – Sacred Celebration of Thanksgiving, about 100 people were in attendance.
- Services during December 1st & 2nd Pledge Sunday, prayerfully consider current and future giving.
- December 16th will only have one service at 10:35am, Saturday, December 15th still as scheduled.
- Mike Markwell will be preaching on December 22nd and 23rd.

Youth Ministry Coordinator's Report (Highlights): Mike Markwell shared his monthly report. The following updates are:

- November 18th Operation Christmas Child boxes were collected, 74 boxes in total.
- December 16th Sunday School Christmas Program and Youth Potluck will follow.
- Shared Sunday School evaluation with average of 15 kids per week, ages 3 through 5th grade.
- Faith Night info October 3rd had 5 students participate, November 7th had 4 students participate and the next one is scheduling for Wednesday, December 5th.
- Mission trip update reserved 12 spots for Middletown, Ohio (a suburb of Cincinnati) from June 23rd to 29th.
- Fundraisers goal of \$5000 for Summer 2019 trips, with half raised through fundraising and other half through family contributions, first fundraiser will be December 16th

As many of you know as I continue to work toward the completion of my Master of Divinity degree, I have had to take a unit of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE). During my unit of CPE, I have served as a chaplain at Advocate Good Samaritan Hospital in Downers Grove and participate in a learning group of fellow seminarians who are also serving as chaplains at the hospital.

As December is upon us, I am in the closing month of my CPE unit. These past three months have proven extremely formational for me. There is something about the experience of meeting with and visiting patients and families many of whom are having one of the worst days of their life.

What I particularly enjoy about the opportunity I have to make visits is how everybody has a story. Everybody has a story about how or why they are in the hospital, but more importantly everyone has a story that is their life. Sometimes I get the privilege of a patient deciding to tell me a snapshot of their story. Some stories, I'm told are blissful reminiscence. One patient recounted to as we watched the sunset out her husband's hospital window a vacation her and her husband took together when they were young. Her mother watched their kids and they drove down to Key West, Florida and sat at the end of a road and watched the sunset. A sunset so beautiful that she recalled everyone applauding when it was over. Some stories have a much more somber tone to them. A middle age patient I saw recently recounted the loss of her adult son.

These stories that I encounter tend to be surrounding grief. People in the hospital may be grieving from several things, the loss of a loved one or their own mortality, the loss of independence, or the grief around the disruption to what they had considered "normal". What I have learned is that there are many ways people experience and express grief.

I am grateful for the experience of CPE and what it has done to prepare me to continue in my ministry.





- 3. Replace the lid and put the dispenser in a bathroom or kitchen.




